

Happy is the nation that has no history is a piece about resistance and the struggle against racial discrimination, from the 1960s to the present day.

Total running time is 55 minutes and 10 seconds.

This radiophonic composition is at once literary, musical and historical and proposes a poetic and political journey structured by excerpts from a short story entitled *Whatever Happened to Interracial Love?* by the African American film-maker Kathleen Collins. Written at the end of the 1960s, the story and its characters anchor us intimately in the heart of the subject, in an apartment shared by two roommates of different coloured skin in New York City. It's 1963, a key moment in contemporary history, when an entire generation aspired towards greater equality, fraternity and solidarity. Idealism began to take shape, nothing could be taken lightly. Each gesture toward the other(s), each act against the segregationist society in place constituted a real risk.

That precise moment in time and the young people of that generation (as well as their descendants), their passion, audacity and even faults will be put into the spotlight and on air. Although they didn't quite accomplish all their goals, the way they opened up is forever before us, while the struggle against hate and discrimination is an on going reality. You could say that is an American story, yes. But consider America an archetype and its myth a story that belongs to us all. As writer Carlos Fuentes put it, "The myth is a past with a future that acts on the present."
