






Through performances created collaboratively by experts in and outside of the arts, Kaimera Productions [kai-mee-rah] provides platforms for audiences to come together in dialogue and examine some of the hardest questions our global society faces. Kaimera creates original performances and live experiences that blend theatre, music, dance, multimedia, visual arts and more. Kaimera is an international company based in New York City and Paris, with ongoing projects in the United States, France, Turkey, Mozambique, and India.






Kaimera Productions was founded in 2016 by theater maker, director, and educator Simón Adinia Hanukai and musician, photographer, and public policy specialist Jonathan Camuzeaux. We create and produce original performances that blend the live arts with audience immersion, often in public spaces and unconventional locations that are not traditionally associated with the presentation of the performing arts (e.g. historical monuments, heritage sites, public spaces, and buildings that are seminal to their local communities yet have fallen into oblivion or lost resonance over time). By taking spectators out of their seats and placing them at the center of the action, we move away from the traditional passive speaker-listener model towards a synergetic knowledge and culture sharing experience.

We work collaboratively with other artists and organizations to develop and implement cross-disciplinary, often participatory, projects as platforms for audiences to come together in dialogue around some of the most complex questions our global society faces. Rather than adopting one perspective and offering answers, we give our audiences a voice to ask their own questions in topics that often feel out of reach.

Our work reacts to the increasing divisiveness that has surfaced out of a deeply fractured society. We instead affirm the value of connecting through culture against the notion of "us vs. them" and bringing people together to strengthen connections across generations, races, religions, and nationalities. Our artistic practice itself is rooted in collaboration as a means of promoting ideals of cultural exchange and understanding and building bridges between artists and communities as a social activity of sharing.

We work internationally, yet our work is deeply rooted in the communities we work with, and are currently developing projects with a wide cohort of collaborators in four continents.






We Will Return in the Spring

We Will Return in the Spring is an immersive site-specific work that re-imagines Anton Chekhov's iconic work The Cherry Orchard. Designed for historic spaces that allude to Europe's colonial past, as is the Château de Belloy Saint-Léonard in Hauts-de-France, the work preserves the themes that Chekhov raised at his work, transporting the narrative to the 21st century postcolonial context. The next developmental residencies are scheduled for November 2021 and April 2022 and the work is expected to premiere in October 2022.

DATAPRINT

DATAPRINT is an experience at the intersection of gaming and performance that investigates the impact of a data-driven world on individuals, society, and democracy. The project is developed as part of the prestigious CHIMÈRES Residency awarded by the French Ministry of Culture, Théâtre Nouvelle Génération, and Le Lieu Unique. Its first version, a multimedia interactive installation that invites audiences to visualize the impact of their online fingerprint, premiered simultaneously in 2018 at The Tech Museum of Innovation in San Jose, USA, and the Cubbon Park Metro Station in Bangalore, India.










The Kaimera Lab is a 10-day intensive training designed for performing artists, narrative & experience designers, and interdisciplinary artists. It encapsulates the principles of Kaimera's practice on creating and producing new forms of live performance, particularly work that is immersive, participatory, site-specific. The first Kaimera Lab took place in France in July 2021, gathering 18 professional artists from 9 different countries across 3 continents, and culminated with a final performance for residents of the surrounding villages. The Kaimera Lab will take place annually in the summer.
